Monday:


First, find out who the Maya were and where they lived. When were they alive? Are they still around today? Then, research two types of people typical to the Maya civilisation: King, priest, palace official, craftsman, farmer, labourer, slave. Find out what their typical life would be like and compare the two. Which role would you enjoy the most and why? Write a short diary entry pretending that you are a Maya of your chosen role.

Tuesday:

What was a typical Mayan house like? Find out the key features of a typical Maya house then draw and annotate a picture. If possible, make a model of your house using resources you have at home (cardboard, paper, sticks, grass, sand, mud). Discover Chichen Itza. Chichen Itza is one of the wonders of the world (Miss Jones visited last year in Mexico). Discover its many wonders (it was renowned for holding many gruesome sacrifices!).

Wednesday:

The Mayans believed in hundreds of different gods and they believed different gods controlled different aspects of the natural world. The Mayans were known for making regular human sacrifices to please and make amends to the gods. Research some of the Mayan gods. How many gruesome ways that they made blood sacrifices can you find? Choose an image of a Mayan god and design a mask for this god. You can draw a picture; make a statue or a model. Have fun!



Thursday:

The Mayan number system consisted of dots, lines and shells. Discover how they Mayans wrote their numbers and write some equations for yourself and/or a family member to answer using the Mayan number depictions. Challenge us to answer some of your equations!

Friday:

The Maya are known for their chocolate. Here is a typical Mayan hot chocolate recipe:

Ancient Maya Hot Chocolate

Only the rich and noble members of Maya society drank this chocolately treat. Is your palate distinguished enough to appreciate its rich, wholesome flavour?

Ingredients (Makes 2 small servings)

3 tablespoons of instant hot chocolate powder 250ml of milk

1 teaspoon of ground cinnamon

A pinch of chilli powder

Equipment

Small jug Spoon (teaspoon and tablespoon) Pan for boiling milk



Step 1. Mix the cocoa, cinnamon and chilli together in a small jug.



Step 2. Heat the milk slowly in a small pan on the stove (or in a microwave) until it is bubbly and frothy.



Step 3. Pour the milk into the jug containing the cocoa and spices and stir well.



Top Tip!

If you want to make your hot chocolate more authentic, then use cacao (dark chocolate) and pour it back and forth between two mugs to make it frothy. Depictions on vases show us that this is what the ancient Maya did!

If you can, make the hot chocolate and write a review on how you think it tastes. Could it be improved? How does it compare to how you would make hot chocolate? Then, design your own hot chocolate and write the recipe out (we would live to give some a go). Please send pictures of your hot chocolate experiences.

If you are not able to make the hot chocolate, write down your thought about whether you think you would enjoy the hot chocolate and any ideas on changes that you would make. Then design and a write a recipe for your own hot chocolate.

We hope you have fun with your Mayan project this week. Keep us updated on all the interesting things you find out.

Maya Creation Story

They chirped and mewed at the top of their lungs until the noise was so deafening, that Tepeu and Gucumatz ordered them to stop. The first race of men were made from wet clay. The creators gave them life, and the first men tried to speak; but instead they crumbled apart soon after they were made. The Maker and the Feathered Spirit were determined to create a sturdier race of men.

These eight men and women were the ancestors of all Quiche men and women today. Even today their sight and understanding of the world is not perfect.


